Pink Truck Carries Breast Cancer Message

With approximately 14,000 Australian women expected to be diagnosed with breast cancer this year, Mining Dump Body Tray manufacturer, Duratray International has launched the *Duratray Pink Dump Truck* to support the National Breast Cancer Foundation (NBCF).

Forming part of BHP Billiton Worsley Alumina's new fleet of Caterpillar 785CXQ haul trucks which are being fitted with Duratray's suspended dump body system, the pink truck was unveiled on Saturday at the Worsley Alumina Bauxite Mine near Boddington, 120km south-east of Perth.

The unveiling came as part of Worsley's special Family Open Day to celebrate the new truck fleet, where mining personnel and their families enjoyed tours of the mine and caught the first glimpse of the pink behemoth.

During the event, Duratray presented a novelty-sized cheque of \$5000 to the Breast Cancer Foundation. Worsley has matched the contribution from Duratray with its own \$5000 donation.

NBCF CEO Sue Murray said that the continued support from organisations like Duratray International has allowed NBCF to fund research that has contributed to a decrease in breast cancer related deaths by 27 percent since 1994.

"Although the incidence of breast cancer is increasing, improvements in research means that survival rates are on the rise," she said.

"With the colour pink so closely linked to the breast cancer cause, the pink truck will be a timely reminder to all women to be breast aware and to join our efforts to fund vital research, that will ultimately help save women's lives."

Duratray Managing Director Marco Medel said the Company chose to contribute to the breast cancer cause not only to build awareness but also to demonstrate its support for the growing number of female workers entering the mining industry.

“This is our way to educate all of the women in our industry who are also mothers, wives, daughters, sisters and friends,” he said.

“So many Australians are touched by this illness and we decided a 150-tonne bright pink truck was a unique way to capture people’s attention and help promote this important cause.”

Boddington Bauxite Mine General Manger Richard Carcenac welcomed the commitment from Duratray and said that Worsley was pleased to match the contribution for such a worthy cause.
